Dear Friends,

Like so many people and charities, the ToolBank has had a challenging yet inspiring year. Way back in January, we were poised to have our busiest year yet - and in fact the first two months of 2020 were busier than any other January or February to date. Then, COVID-19 hit.

Soon, we began to see that the ToolBank has the potential to provide support during any challenge - even one that seemed unimaginable in 2019. Here are just a few highlights of how we found ways to serve even in the midst of a pandemic:

- By April, we had collected and distributed over 20,000 PPE items to healthcare workers, including N95 masks, Tyvek suits and face shields.
- We supported charitable partners as they filled growing challenges for our neighbors. Tables, chairs, traffic cones and shade tents served distribution of food, diapers, and books.
- We added COVID-19 specific safety items to inventory, like touchless infrared thermometers, hand sanitizer stations, plexiglass barriers and social distancing markers.



TOOLS FOR HOPE

Houston Community ToolBank is a nonprofit tool lending program that empowers fellow nonprofits to tackle community-based projects throughout our city. We have 22,000 plus items and 295 tool types in our warehouse. Toolbank borrowers are not only traditional nonprofits, but also schools, faith-based organizations, neighborhood associations and many others. Access to ToolBank inventory relieves the burden of purchasing, storing, maintaining and repairing the items essential to projects and events. In a sector that consistently faces constraints of time, personnel and budget, our tools allow organizations to achieve their varying, passionate visions for a thriving community.

ON THE COVER: In fall of this year, we received a large donation of masks and hand sanitizer from Bank of America and UPS. THE AFTER HOURS CONTAINER

A YEAR OF PROJECTS

When we got our After Hours Container back in 2018, we never could have imagined that it would be the center of our entire operation during a global pandemic. From the earliest days until now, the container has allowed continuous service to our nonprofit partners in numerous ways - all while keeping our staff and borrowers safe with contactless pick ups and drop offs. Virtually every order that has gone ot into the community did so through our After Hours containers.

GOING GREEN

AT THE TOOLBANK


This year, even as we adapted to help our community during a pandemic, we also moved the needle toward being a greener organization and we began to build a system to measure our postive environmental impact.

Thanks to Green Mountain Energy Sun Club, we added solar panels to our shipping pick up containers and a rainwater collection system to our warehouse. The solar panels allow the remote pick up containers' smart locks and security lights to operate off-the-grid - ensuring easy access for borrowers across Greater Houston. Our rainwater system gathers water from 12,000 square feet of warehouse roof - which equates to 7,416 gallons for every inch of rain that falls! This rainwater is used to wash tools, all while reducing runoff during heavy rainstorms.

Later in the year the ToolBank worked with a team of expert volunteers, who helped us build the Green Savings tool. For years, we've been searching for a way to measure the environmental impact of borrowing our tools rather than buying the same items - and finally we are on track to capture real data. With the skills of the team, we are now able to estimate data like water saved based on tool components, fuel saved for transportation based on researched shipping distances, and package weight diverted from landfill.

We are so proud of the green projects happening at the ToolBank - and we can't wait to refine the data and wash our tools in 2021.

I am absolutely thrilled to take the helm as board president as we move into 2021. Even with the uncertainty of the pandemic, we have some exciting plans on the horizon.

The first plan for 2021 is a complete rollout of the expansion efforts. The expansion was delayed due to COVID-19, however the last containers will be placed in the early months of 2021. The containers will reduce travel for nonprofits on the outskirts of the city - in Galveston County, Katy, Montgomery County and Fort Bend county. And, we hope that we will bring in some new ToolBank members who might not otherwise make the trip to our warehouse

We're also excited to join forces with the Atlanta ToolBank to pilot a training program. Although one pillar of our mission is "expertise", the ToolBank has historically been focused on providing tools. The tool training programming will equip nonprofits, staff and volunteers with technical and leadership skills for more impactful projects.

Lastly, we'll be working towards showcasing our Green Savings tool - which creates a whole new way of looking at the ways the ToolBank helps the environment. I think you'll be impressed when you see some of the numbers - like how our posthole diggers have saved over 28,000 gallons of water during their 5 years of use.

Finally, I would like to take a moment to thank John Crabb, our outgoing board president, for his years of service as a passionate advocate for the ToolBank. We're looking forward to serving our community - in both new and old ways - throughout 2021.
